Deanna Bowen's *Black Drones in the Hive* will remain on view until 23 May 2021

23 February 2021, Kitchener ON – The Kitchener-Waterloo Art Gallery is proud to announce that Montreal-based artist Deanna Bowen's <u>Black Drones in the Hive</u> will remain on view until Sunday 23 May in both our Main and Eastman Galleries. With the Gallery now re-opened to the public following a two-month closure during the recent province-wide stay-at-home order, these extended dates will allow more visitors to explore this sprawling exhibition connecting local history with contemporary conversations on race, colonization and cultural monuments.

By combing local archives, KWAG's Permanent Collection, historical publications, and wartime propaganda, Bowen's exhibition weaves together narrative threads of labour, migration,

dispossession and militarization. Collectively, this interdisciplinary work invites audiences to consider how our historical canon is constructed over time, and whose stories are hidden from public view.

"As a museum that prioritizes contemporary art, KWAG is especially attentive to the ways in which artists of our time help us to understand what precipitates this moment and where our actions may lead us," says Crystal Mowry, KWAG's Senior Curator. "Deanna Bowen is an artist who deftly creates a paper trail for the grievances and Black trauma that underlie our present-day



reckoning. Through her extensive research, she shines a light on the various avenues through which power can enable erasure and refuse duty."

"Deanna Bowen unearths ugly truths in our regional histories and as such, her work is timely in the current climate of systemic racism," explains Shirley Madill, KWAG's Executive Director. "We are pleased to create space for such critical voices in our Gallery."

<u>This exhibition can also be explored online</u> through video tours hosted by Crystal Mowry, a recording of our recent Artist Talk with Deanna Bowen, and related online programs.

"It is an unbelievable honour to have worked so closely with Deanna on this exhibition during a time of so much uncertainty," adds Mowry. "We are proud to be sharing this work in a moment that so desperately needs it."
